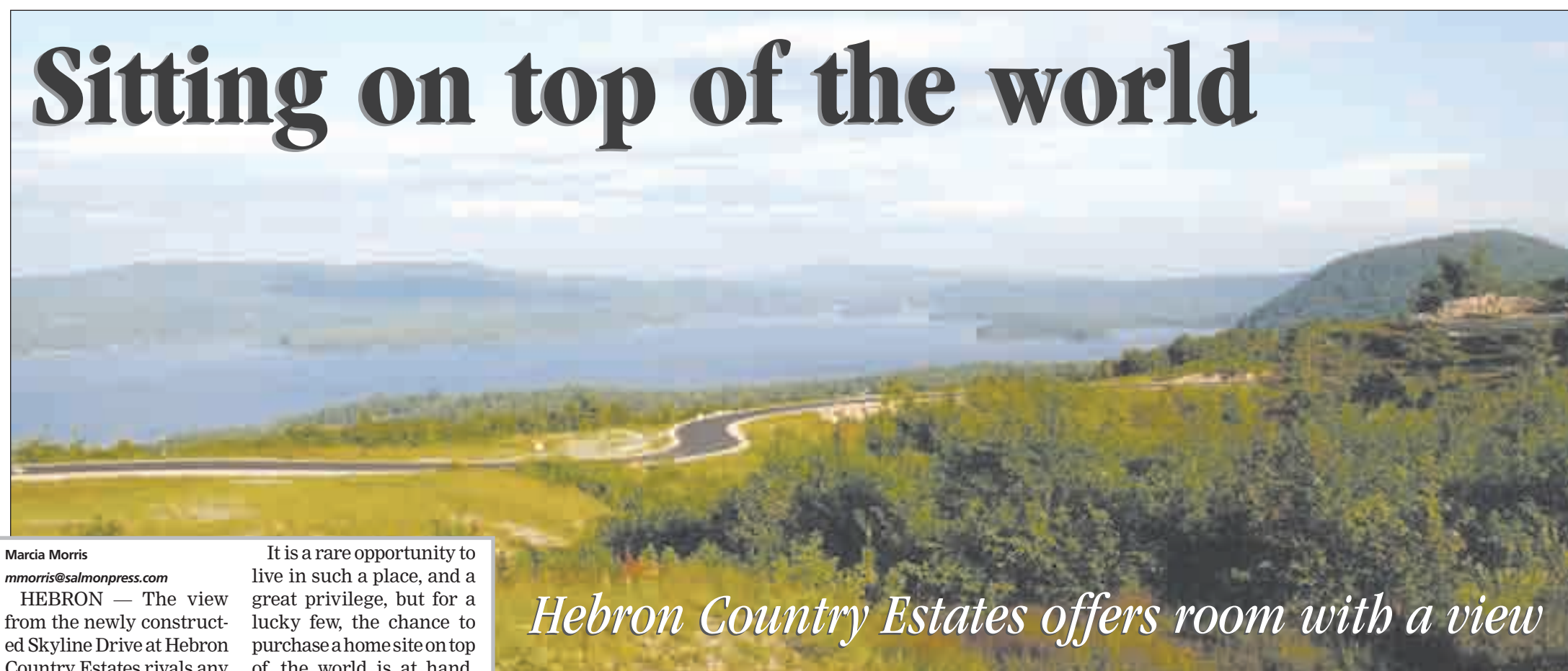


## Sitting on top of the world



### Hebron Country Estates offers room with a view

HEBRON — The view from the newly constructed Skyline Drive at Hebron Country Estates rivals any in the Lakes Region. It is the kind of sweeping panorama ordinarily reserved for those hardy few who hike to the peaks of New Hampshire's rugged mountains for a brief glimpse of the spectacular expanse of majestic mountains and the serenity of a quiet, blue lake nestled at the foot of the wooded hillsides.

In the course of one recent weekend afternoon, dozens of visitors parked their cars and wandered High Cliffs Circle to take in the view of Newfound, from the beaches at the southern tip of the lake in Bristol to the White Mountains in the north. Tiny boats dot the surface of the lake below and familiar landmarks can be identified on the eastern shoreline. On the Fourth of July, the road was crammed with cars catching the scene of fireworks from around the lake.

At dawn, the mist rises from the surface of the calm lake and wisps ascend like the smoke of hundreds of small campfires from the surrounding forest floor as the sun comes up over Bridgewater Mountain. At twilight, the lights from distant houses come on, dotting the hillsides and shoreline, twinkling like fireflies. At sunset, the purple and orange glow descends over the entire scene. Deep in the dark of an August night, the shooting stars can be clearly seen, darting amongst the brilliant constellations overhead.

As anyone fortunate enough to live on the shores of a lake knows, the many moods of the ever-changing landscape provide an endless source of inspiration.

It is a rare opportunity to live in such a place, and a great privilege, but for a lucky few, the chance to purchase a home site on top of the world is at hand. Four of the 26 lots available at the newly developed Hebron Country Estates have already been sold, but outstanding views are the primary feature of the remaining available parcels. Each lot is between approximately 2 to 6 acres, with a 360 degree view, surrounded by 80 plus acres of forested land abutting the Audubon Society Trail system on Bear Mountain and the Elwell Trail System.

Developer Larry Kill says that he has carefully designed each lot to provide unobstructed views for each potential homeowner. Agreements with property owners protect the views and provide guidelines for construction of new homes that ensure that any future building with be in keeping with the New England Village character of the small town of Hebron on the northern end of Newfound Lake.

Kill says that he worked very hard to get through the tough planning board process in Hebron, and that zoning changes since his development was approved, designed to preserve the pristine quality of Newfound Lake, mean that this kind of ridgeline development is unlikely to ever happen again in the low tax town of Hebron, or possibly anywhere in the watershed.

The development sits above Camp Wicosuta on West Shore Road with views of Sugar Loaf Mountain and Wellington Park to the south, and the White Mountains to Franconia Notch in the north. The road has been recently paved and the home-sites are to have underground utilities, including high speed internet. The first

### Sheedy is new chef of The Manor on Golden Pond

HOLDERNESS — The Manor on Golden Pond, a AAA Four-Diamond resort near Squam Lake in picturesque Holderness this week welcomes the arrival of Chef Peter Sheedy.

"That's how I got a taste for cooking as a way of life. Spending summers cooking

or washing dishes is de rigueur for young people around the lake. The business is so seasonal, the [hospitality] industry more or less depends on it," observes Sheedy.

Sheedy has come a long way since washing dishes in Wolfeboro — literally.

"I've worked in every corner of the country, really," says the well-traveled Chef, who has honed his craft in

posts as far-flung as Portland, Oregon; San Diego, California; and, most recently, Atlanta, Georgia.

"Moving around like that really teaches you a lot. American food isn't as homogenous as some people, especially abroad, like to think. Everywhere I went, I found amazing regional food traditions alive and well. Still, as far as I'm concerned, fresh Atlantic lobster, funky old

cheddar cheese, and real maple syrup can't be beat. There's something special about this area. Even Keisha, my wife — a tried and true Chicagoan — would sometimes confess that she missed New England, and wanted to come back."

In addition to his peripatetic learning, Sheedy was formally trained at Vermont's New England Culinary Institute, and holds an undergraduate degree from Montreal's prestigious McGill University.

"I kind of did it backwards," concedes Sheedy. "There's so much great food, with so much variety, in Montreal. It would have been impossible for a lifelong foodie like me not to get distracted by it all. When the time came, culinary school just seemed like it would be a

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# MVSB hosting Main Office Open House *Chef*

REGIONAL — Meredith Village Savings Bank is celebrating 140 years of serving the Lakes Region with a series of Open House events throughout the year in the many communities the bank serves. On Friday, July 31, 1-3 p.m., the festivities continue at the Bank's Main Office on Route 25 in Meredith.

Guests will enjoy refreshments, giveaways, and the opportunity to learn more about the 140-year history of the Bank, which was founded by Meredith businessman Seneca Ladd in 1869. Visitors can peruse photographs and information chronicling the past 140 years and meet CEO and President Sam Laverack and other members of MVSB's leadership.

The history of Meredith Village Savings Bank's Main Office dates back to the origins of the Bank. For the first 55 years of its existence, MVSB operated in a room on the second floor of the build-

ing that now houses the Meredith Historical Society. In 1924, the office moved to a newly constructed brick building just down the block (which now houses municipal offices for the town of Meredith).

When continued growth made it apparent that larger quarters would be needed for both the Bank and its associate, the Meredith Trust Company, plans took shape for a new building on the Charles and Cote lots on Winnepesaukee Street (now known as Route 25). In May 1958, the Bank moved into the new space, where it continues to do business today. In addition to offering full-service banking, the Main Office houses the Bank's senior leadership team and several of its administrative offices, including the Human Resources Department. MVSB also operates a second full-service branch in Meredith at the Olde

"The kitchen here has a great tradition of fine cooking, and of using the best local ingredients," says Sheedy, "maintaining and expanding that tradition is Priority Number One, especially when it comes to ingredients. I think there are even more great local and organic products available now than there were even a few years ago. If I'm not busy in the kitchen, chances are I'm on the road, looking around the state for great stuff to add to our repertoire."

"Of course, every chef puts a personal spin on his cooking, and I'm also intent on getting the word out that there's a new voice behind

the food the Manor has been known for. The feedback has been overwhelmingly positive. We've got quite a talented team, all of who are as new to the property as I am, and we're doing a lot of exciting things that are unique in this area. Our formal dining room is offering a tasting menu, and is wonderful for special occasion and destination dining. We have a bistro menu, also, which features a lot of Spanish and Mediterranean influence this season — including a selection of Tapas, which is something I haven't seen anywhere else in the region. And soon we'll be offering a casual lunch for the summer.
